Sarah Young in her devotional "Jesus Calling," writes, "I tend to feel

stuck in situations I'd like to change because I can see only the present moment. But You [God] look at the big picture—all the moments of my life—and You are doing far more than I can comprehend."

We are indeed limited in our thinking and in our doing. Our mission work depends on clear creative minds, in addition to a trusting heart. There is a danger of being too focused on the present, whether good or bad, and when times are tough it is even easier to discount the possibilities of tomorrow. The weight alone can hold us back or push us causing us to sink further into our own little bubble. Fear, sorrow, pain, and other emotions cloud our judgment and prevent us from seeing beyond that which has become all-consuming.

How <u>do</u> we look past the hurdles, the setbacks, the unanswered prayers, and trust that God's got this? How do we give everything that weighs heavy on our hearts over to God? One of the reasons I love the above verse from Ephesians is Paul's use of the word immeasurably. Immeasurable means, incalculable, vast, and endless – only God can do infinite. How would we even look that far since we are finite on this earth?

Perhaps that is why God's promise found throughout the Bible is fundamental to our faith. I like the New Living Translation of Hebrews 12:5, "*I will never fail you. I will never abandon you.*" (There are at least 63 other verses like it.) Our trust is based on God's infinite Truth that God is right smack dab in the middle of our struggles right along with us. We have an amazing God on our side and will never be alone in our battles. Not only does God promise to walk with us every step of our life's journey but because of God's faithfulness and perseverance, we cannot and will not fail. God always has our back. Through no power of our own we can look beyond today and so far into the future, immeasurably becomes a reality.

When we plant a seed, a flower, or a tree we know God will water, feed, and strengthen it, and hold it closely so that nothing can wear or tear it down. In turbulence, pounding storms, dry spurts, and dangerous times God's got

WHOA ... HAVE YOU SEEN THOSE BIRDHOUSES?!



Thank you, Craig Korte, for making birdhouses that not only add beauty to Trinity's grounds but for making some very lucky birds happy. *The Tidings* asked Craig for more information about what inspired and interested him to do this project. His response follows.

Working with wood has always been a challenging and fascinating hobby for me. Rarely do I build or create a finished product which hasn't been preceded by partial attempts. Building our church Bird Houses was no exception. In conversations with Greg Kulp over the course of years, he mentioned that he had a supply of TMI Redwood stacked in the rafters of his garage. He gave me some to work with a few years ago. I built a massive birdhouse for a very special young lady, Cheri and I have grown very fond of. This was the prototype. It's rather time-consuming but extremely enjoyable to see progress. When the

bevel degree is set on the table saw, and the width is in agreement; making shingles moves fairly rapidly. While the positive characteristics of Redwood are many, the downside is the fine dust created by cutting, or the instances of slivers due to its dryness and porosity. The log cabin appearance was just something I wanted to try. I guess Lincoln log projects as a youth had some influence.

My goal with this project was to add something to the picnic area which would add a little color and hopefully attract some songbirds. It's unlikely to happen this year, but I imagine they'll be a few new residents next Spring. This fall I'd like to build a few bird feeders in hopes of attracting Cardinals and possibly move to butterfly houses next year. My only regret is that I should have made a few more Bird houses. Maybe next year!

Who is a *"real"* American?

My husband and I live in Skokie, Ill., a diverse community. Our neighbors to the west are an octogenarian Taiwanese Evangelical couple who regularly order meals from Kosher to Go. Our neighbors to the east are a Ukrainian and Russian multigenerational family. Our grocery stores have both kosher and halal departments. As I drive past the elementary school on my way to work, I see moms and dads in jeans along with women in saris or hijabs and men in thobes or yarmulkes. More than 90 languages are spoken in the homes of our school district. We pay our taxes, mow our (tiny) lawns, worship, raise our children and pretty much get along in our little village of Skokie.

Late one afternoon a few years ago I was finishing up yard work. I had been weeding and trimming all day. I was tired and grass-stained. Just one more pile of leaves needed to be swept up. I noticed a woman walking toward me so I hurried to get the sidewalk cleared. She stopped and told me that she had seen me working all day and thought I might be too tired to prepare supper. She had made

a meal for me and my husband. It was during Ramadan—the month when Muslims fast from food and water during the day and engage in prayer and acts of charity. This was her act of charity and generosity. She smiled and walked away. I was stunned.

There has been an alarming rise in hate speech and violence against religious and ethnic minorities in this country. At the same time, we've seen an increased polarization among us, even in our dear church. There is a movement to define what it means to be a "real American." Some would define this as white, Christian and native born. When Lutheran immigrants first came to this country in the 18th and 19th centuries, they weren't considered real Americans. They didn't speak English or fit in with the Deist, Calvinist religious majority. They were "other" and therefore suspect. German Lutheran immigrants weren't considered white when they settled here. Neither were Irish, Italians or Poles. Catholics and Jews were considered an alien threat.

An element in our country wants to legislate that the United States is a Christian nation where Christianity should be privileged and only Christians should hold office. This is Christian Nationalism, which is neither Christian nor patriotic.

It's ironic that the Puritans fled religious persecution and that the First Amendment states "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free expression thereof," yet an element in our country wants to legislate that the United States is a Christian nation where Christianity should be privileged and only Christians should hold office. This is Christian Nationalism, which is neither Christian nor patriotic. There is no doubt that the Founders were Christian and that a majority of Americans identify as Christian. That is different from declaring Christianity as the established religion of the United States. And, dear church, let's be clear, a Christian Nationalist does not define Lutherans as "Christian."

God knows I love my country. This beautiful, fragile, yet surprisingly resilient experiment in democracy and nationhood that's not predicated on shared ethnicity is unique among nations. My grandfather, father and uncles all served during World War I and World War II. I had the honor of placing a wreath on behalf of the ELCA at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier in Arlington National Cemetery. I won't have my patriotism questioned. Christian Nationalism is a perversion of the gospel and a threat to our democracy. It's precisely because I love my country that I warn against it.

Who is a "real American"? I say that my Muslim neighbor walking freely down the street in a hijab to offer a meal to her Christian neighbor during Ramadan is a real American. Motivated by her Muslim faith she acted as neighbor to me. She is not less American because she is Muslim. Because she is an American, she can be her authentic self and participate in building our community and country. What binds us together is not ethnicity but shared participation in our civic life springing out of our cultural heritages and working for the common good
