

Trinity Tidings September 2023

"Be anxious for nothing but in everything by prayer and supplication, with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God" Philippians 4:6.

As summer wanes, we may become anxious about fall and the beginning of a new school year. Even if we do not have children returning, we know what it is like to see our loved ones go off to what has now become a more perilous environment. I remember the anxiety I felt on the first day my daughter got on the bus to go to kindergarten, 40 some years ago, and we did not have near the worries. And even if we do not have grandchildren in school, we understand the emotional toll it can have. There is no denying the shift in the country's overall mood. However, I believe there are good teachers, aids, coaches, and staff guarding our children despite distractions and safety issues. And God wants to hear everything that is on our minds and hearts, big or small!

There are many reasons to be on edge, I suppose, but even in the Old and New Testaments there were conflicts, clashing of opinions and lost souls. However, what we see and experience in the 21st century is on a whole new level. In addition to increasing number of natural disasters, our war continues to be against hatred, and discrimination, and now, cyber trolls and strangers invading our personal space. Ruth Chou Simons, author and artist, in her book, <u>Gracelaced</u>, reminds us that "To lay down our big view of self is to throw ourselves on the mercy of an infinitely bigger God" (p133). When we look toward a higher power for sustenance, confidence and encouragement, we realize God made us just the way we are and that should be enough.

As we try to do what is right in the face of conflict and change, remember that pride and peer pressure can influence how we navigate the crazy cycle of being genuine, or the person everyone expects us to be. Today kids will be laughed at or chastised for being who they are, or who they are not, and unfortunately there are adults who still need to learn to accept people from all walks of life. Peter, in his first letter to new persecuted Christians, says we must first humble ourselves...so that God can exalt us. Too often, outside influences pierce our thoughts and minds as we work to become better Christians. Even the most faithful can experience a numbing of the heart. We cannot lose our way; we owe it to the following generations to find a clearer path by laying all our concerns at the foot of the cross. We must humble ourselves to the point of vulnerability allowing God to take the lead. "We can't find Him faithful to care for our worries and concerns if we don't take ourselves off the throne that rightfully belongs to Him," writes Simons (Ibid).

To strengthen our resolve, Peter tells us to "Cast all your anxieties on to God, because He cares for you" (5:6-7). When we cast our anxieties onto God, and let our requests be made known to Him, we are free to be our best person for God and then we will find this amazing peace. Notice the hovering clouds in the above photo,

infringing upon the pretty flowerbed. Indicative of life, this picture also reminds us that we can still be beautiful in the middle of chaos, threats and bullies. "We lose nothing (but our pride and control) and gain everything (His care and provision) when we humble ourselves and esteem Him Ruler of All" (Simons Ibid.). Now look at the clouds in this second photo where the cross stands strong midst the clouds projecting beauty and majesty. When we surrender and put our hope in the One who made us, "the peace of God which surpasses all understanding, will guard our hearts and minds through Christ Jesus" (Philippians 4:7).







PRAYER SHAWL & QUILT MINISTRY NEWS

On Sunday, August 13, Pastor Cheri blessed the 24 quilts we will be sending to Lutheran World Relief.

Quilts in Tanzania — The Erick Memorial Foundation for Education and Rehabilitation of the Disabled (EMFERD) provides education and rehabilitation, and assists with the general welfare of people with disabilities in Morogoro, Tanzania. Most of the children at the EMFERD orphanage have been abandoned by their parents and caregivers, overwhelmed by the prospect of caring for a disabled child. To help lighten the financial burden of providing care, LWR provided the orphanage 29 Mission Quilts, plus School Kits, rice, beans, tomatoes and bananas. LWR also installed a rainwater catchment system so they have clean safe water.




